

- Intent was to explore the role of park and recreation agencies in disaster management, response, and recovery
- Sent to multiple mailing lists of recipients in parks and recreation, public health, and related fields more than 4000 total
- Voluntary responses collected in the fall of 2019



Have you or your agency been affected by, or responded to, a major emergency or natural disaster in the past 10 years?








Findings:

- Local park and recreation agencies play a significant role in disaster response, recovery and management
- Managing shelters and assessing damage are the most common roles that agencies fill, but other roles are common as well
- A majority of the agencies represented have been affected by or responded to major disasters/emergencies within the past 10 years
- A majority of the agencies represented have **NOT received training or** preparation for an emergency or disaster in the past three years
- Disasters addressed by these agencies take a wide variety of forms
- Financial concerns and staffing levels are the primary barriers faced by agencies in providing disaster services

"Parks & Rec in this city definitely has a large roll in emergency management here (shelter, food, building assessments, clean up, volunteer management, etc.) "

"Emergencies may include health care issues, assessment of structures, and other liabilities that I do not believe should involve recreation professionals."



"I have thought about something like this since seeing shelters full of people during Hurricane Katrina. It makes sense that people housed in shelters would benefit from some healthy distractions that can help them spend their time positively while awaiting what they will need to do next.".

> "Whatever the plan may be it must be practiced for you to have success."


"We feel the police and fire depts are in place and trained to handle emergencies. We don't believe our small staff can contribute or add to their abilities."


> "Since we have nothing in place, I feel we would need to start from the ground up in preparing to be involved in this process."




Can you identify barriers that you feel exist to developing a professional deployment program to assist park and recreation agencies restore service



Is your parks and recreation agency represented on your Community's Emergency Management Team?




Does your agency have a specific Parks and **Recreation Emergency** Management Plan?












